Children throng my snack centre for the tasty and tangy Kuzhi Paniyaram (Kuzi Paniyaram is a South Indian delicacy made by steaming batter using a mould). Working in my centre the entire day, I make Rs.300 per day. Since then, there's a whirlwind of change in our life. I have the confidence to educate my children and lead a life with renewed hope. Thank you SSH for helping me establish this snack centre.





SSH provides educational and healthcare support to 450 children from Nammakal and Dindigul Districts who are HIV Positive/Living with HIV/AIDS. Additionally,

SSH supports the parents with an income generation activity to earn a living and arranges exposure visits to places of interest helping them overcome their traumatic struggles.

44 children had access to ART (Antiretroviral) and ICTCs (Intergrated Counselling and Testing Centre) Centers, resulting in improved overall health status.

100 parents are small entrepreneurs earning Rs.250/per day, rising out of abject poverty. They now have hope for the future.

#### Indhu, her infectious smile and her goat - inseparable!

Against all odds, Indhu\* emerged as a champion. From driven to flee away her village along with her family to living in deplorable conditions, the 12-year old Indhu is back in school. She is now honing her skills in math to become an accountant.

Back in 2011, her family left their village Kamalapuram in Dindigul District, unable to bear the discrimination from family and the community. Except her brother, the entire family is affected by HIV/AIDS.

When SSH team met the family for the first time, they were in critical need of healthcare, nutritious meals and other essential support.

"From 2011 onwards, I have received educational materials, nutritional and healthcare packages. I am on ART (Antiretroviral Therapy Adherence). Now my CD4 level is 2420. Strengthening the skills of children like me along with life skills are the crucial support, we have received from SSH. Also, SSH helped my parents buy two goats and they have multiplied to 23 goats worth Rs.69,000," says the beaming Indhu.




With SSH support, I attend ART Adherence regularly. My CD4 level has increased from 246 to 560.

SSH creates awareness and educates the community on prevention measures of HIV/AIDS. Besides through CBR, we provide rehabilitation, educational materials, and strengthens the activities of CBOs. Reinforcing the community to fight against discrimination, linking the groups and individuals to banks and government schemes and enriching the knowledge of the communities of their rights are the additional support that SSH offers.

**500** women PLHAs (People Living with HIV AIDS) lead a normal life

105 students who appeared for 10th and 12th exams scored above 80 percent.



Parvathi's\* grocery shop is a hub of activity in Ayyampalayam village. "You name it, and you will get them at Parvathi's grocery shop" – is what the women in the small village often say.

For someone not having any experience than working as an agricultural worker and with the failure of monsoon for the last three years, her future looked bleak. Her husband's income as an agricultural labourer too was pitiful. When SSH staff suggested she opens a small shop with their support, Parvathi knew that there's light at the end of the tunnel.

"Today, I earn around Rs.1000 per month and am confident of enhancing the sales. Thanks to AHB and SSH for the positive change in my life" says Parvathi.

#### Other achievements:

- Linking of 80% PLHAs with banks through savings account has led to Pradhan Mantri Jan-Dhan Yojana – promoted by the Prime Minister of India
- Awareness created to utilise 104 services for clarifying health related queries
- PLHAs have become proud owners of movable and immovable assets
- 39 CBR children have joined degree courses and another 20 children enrolled in technical courses like ITI, nursing, lab technician, etc.
- Children follow basic hygienic practices like washing hands with

- soap before eating and after using the bathroom, use of slippers while stepping out.
- SHG members help the PLHAs to receive widow pension, sewing machine and treatment regularly from govt departments and offer interest-free loans for emergencies or start a small business
- Local donors have begun to contribute Rs.50 per month per child for Empowering Adolescent Girls (EAG) scheme regularly.
- Local Resource Mobilization (LRM) days are conducted once in six months as a gesture of support to people affected by HIV/AIDS.



With SSH's support for livestock farming, women such as Mariapushpam is experiencing new hope in her life. "Today my husband looks at me differently: with respect and pride" says Mariapushpam.

People and children Living with and affected by HIV/AIDS need constant healthcare and educational support, encouragement and motivation and a reliable source of income. Our CBOs such as Children Clubs, Little Flower Children Network, Children Support Groups, People Support Group, Alternative Learning Centre, Self Help Groups, Bharathi Women Federation and ASHG (Adolescent Self Help Group) stand as a robust pillar of support to the community. Independent in their roles and responsibilities, these groups carry out various activities ensuring a steady support to these vulnerable communities.





#### LFCN - Little Flower Children Network

- Prevented 6 child marriages through Child Helpline 1098.
- Constructed 40 individual toilets under the total sanitation scheme.
- Planted 200 saplings in villages.
- Created awareness of utilising 104 services for clarifying doubts on health and treatment.
- Participated in general medical camps, pulse polio, immunisation and dengue awareness in 13 villages through cultural events.



#### ALC - Arumbugal Alternative Learning Centre

These centres are set up in remote villages where most of our target children reside.

- The ALC Centres, along with academic concentrate on painting, speech, essay writing, reading, sports and games.
- ALC children had participated in different training programmes like yoga, child rights, adolescent health etc.
- Conducted ALC day at all 20 centers which included cultural events by children on the importance of education and nutrition, protection of child rights, prevention of child abuse, environmental protection, role of parents and making home a safe place for kids
- ALC children went on an exposure visit to railway stations, police stations, courts, district libraries and Banks to learn about these service organizations.

#### CSG - Children Support Group

- Helped 4 CAAs (Children affected by AIDS) to re-join regular schools.
- Linked 15 children with other NGOs for availing support services.
- 8 CAAs received education support from OVC trust with the help of CSG members.

## Small gifts bring hope for the poor

Having clothes on your back and shoes on your feet may sound a basic right – but for the poor – it's a struggle. When the community unite to raise funds – simple items bring much cheer to the poor. This year, we raised Rs.1,93,000 on our local resource mobilisation day – a combined efforts of all the CBOs.





# BWF - Bharathi Women Federation

- Rescued 5 children from sexual abuse
- Prevented 6 child marriages
- Planted 1300 saplings
- Re-enrolled 12 dropout children into regular school.

- Constructed 300 individual toilets through total sanitation scheme
- Solved 6 family issues like property settlements, family disputes and dowry harassment
- Availed civic amenities for the villages - chlorination of tank and bore wells, road facilities, transports and construction of drainages
- Eradicated malpractices in the ration shop at Sanarapatti.
- Started collective IGP with the support of BWF – flower cultivation, cloth selling
- Involved in local resource mobilisation



#### PSG - People Support Group

- 7 PLHAs secured employment.
- Integrated 16 PLHAs into special groups; availed credit facility from banks.
- All PSG members have separate savings account with nationalised banks
- 70% of PSG members are linked with other NGOs and CBOs.

# Restoring new hope and opportunities

The Self Help Group is instrumental in rewriting the story of 46-year old Saroja\* from Kurumpapatti village, Vadasanthur union. After her husband had died eight years back due to HIV/AIDS, Saroja was left alone. "Even though I was falling sick often due to HIV/AIDS, both my sons were unsympathetic and deserted me. I felt I didn't have a future," said Saroja to our team in between crying her heart out. The CBR team inducted her into the local Self Help Group.

Saroja, who drew inspiration from the group says, "A loan from the group helped me set up a small shop in my house itself." Crediting the group for the improvement in her health, Saroja says that seeing her renewed life, her children drew closer to her. She is also part of the 100 days working scheme and earns a decent income

Incidentally, when the CBR met her recently at her shop, Saroja said, "What I look forward the most is to work as the peer educator in my Panchayat."



We celebrated World Food Day in October 2015 in Dindigal and Namakkal to bring awareness to the community on the importance of having nutritious food. There were 400 participants which included children, parents, Self-Help Group and Bharathi Women Federation members. The highlight of the event was the showcase the locally available grains and pulses. Besides, the charts indicating the nutritional value of each vegetable, grains and pulses captured the crowd along with the sumptuous nutritional dishes prepared by SSH staff.

- Continued the Eco-clubs concept of TCA at the campus "One Child One Tree."


