As you all may know SSH was formally registered under the Tamilnadu Societies Registration Act, 1975 on 13.06.1988. Since then, the NGO has gone through different mile stones, organized multi dimensional activities for the upliftment of the poor, marginalized and bring them in the mainstream of society and SSH has been marching with the marginalized people. SSH has obtained 12A, 80G, NGO Darpan, CSR Registration, FCRA renewal etc and working with government, funding partners within India and abroad and other organizations for people's development.

I am sure you will accept that the reporting year 2020 - 2021 is a tragic year globally due to Covid-19 Epidemic first and second wave. Perhaps, first time in the history of mankind, hospital beds for inpatients and acute shortage of qualified medical professionals for providing critical care was rampant. Home quarantine, hospital quarantine, community quarantine etc were the common terminologies used by the medical experts and common people. Globally India is the second most affected country and within India, Tamilnadu is the second most affected state by Covid-19. SSH has gone through this critical period as any other organizations did as lockdown has not been lifted since March 24, 2020 to till date.



We are happy to thank the Almighty for his loving care and protection throughout this epidemic/pandemic/endemic period that has enabled us to serving the poor and needy people in years to come. In spite of the limitations of resource constraints, prolonged lockdown, the pandemic and epidemiological issues and problems, we were able to carry out the following activities during 2020 - 2021.

SSH Helpline

SSH helpline was developed to assist the Corona affected people through our staff as per government instruction. They were working from home and provided support services to the Corona victims through the following ways;

- Counseling to home quarantine people.
- Arranging Ambulance service.
- Finding out the availabilities of hospital beds and informing to the patients/care givers.
- Finding out the availability of Oxygen ventilator facilities and informing to the affected families.
- Arranging supplementary treatment through Siddha medicine.
- Information dissemination about govt welfare / health services.
- Creating awareness on Corona prevention through the use of PPE and vaccination through online.
- Personal Protective Equipments (PPE) like facemask, hand sanitizer, hand washing soap and immunity booster, siddha medicine (Gabasura drink) that can protect the people from the transmission process of Covid-19.

IEC Materials

Information brochure was prepared in Tamil, edited by the medical expert, printed copies and was circulated to the people. The information brochure was containing the following information.

- Covid-19 pandemic transmission process.
- Myths and facts about Covid-19.
- Prevention methods.
- Control of Covid-19 through early diagnosis and treatment.
- Vaccination against Covid-19.
- Need for protein rich food and health drinks.

Protein supplement

Protein supplements and dry ration was distributed to 605 poor families during this year.

Open air Veranda School

The children used to gather in front of the open air veranda of SSH staffs and volunteers who conducted classes for children with following Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) like wearing face mask, hand wash with soap and water and social distancing. SSH staff also helped the children to study their online lessons. The Android phones of staff and volunteers were extensively used for helping the children in their education.

FOSTER A CHILD PROGRAMME (FCP)

Sustaining a conducive atmosphere for learning

SSH provided conducive atmosphere for the learning of underprivileged 350 children and a sustainable livelihood for their parents in Dindigul & Namakkal districts by providing continuous education, ensuring regular healthcare support and enabling the parents to earn an income are some of the objectives of the FCP project.

EDUCATION

- 28 children completed their 10th standard.
- All 34 children who completed their 12th standard, joined degree courses like Engineering, nursing, polytechnic, B.A, B.Sc, etc.
- 100% of our children have passed as per the Government order and are continuing their studies through online and Kalvi channel.

- Got introduced to attend regular zoom meetings.
- Became familiar with the Educational apps.
- Vulnerable 31 dropout children due to exam phobia, forced early marriage, taking care of sick parents etc were prevented and re-enrolled into the same schools.

HEALTH

- All FCP children and their parents are safe and secure and not infected by Corona virus.
- 90% of our target beneficiaries are taking the herbal drinks like kabasura/nilavembu/ginger/pepper tea etc.
- 10 CHLAs could increase their Hb level from 7 gm to 9 gm and ART adherence was kept in spite of the long lockdown.
- 25 Individual family toilets constructed newly at FCP families
- Height & weight increased up to from 1 to 3 kg for 75% of target children.
- CD 4 increased in case of CLHAs.
- There was a conscious shift for nutritious diet as Covid-19 demanded.
- Less incidence of heavy payment on medical bill for FCP families as against other common people.

Livelihood

- 10 members became the pride owners of country chicken rearing with the kind support of local Panchayats.
- 15 members are involved in tailoring, idly flour selling, milch animal rearing etc.
- 42 members created assets in the name of women.
- Around 50 members got job opportunity from quasi government sectors and other NGOs.
- 5 members started own IGP activities with the support of SHGs on interest free loan.
- Almost 90% of our women members started utilizing the nationalized bank services.
- 3 members were able to make minor repair works at their houses.
- All FCP mothers enjoy a membership in any of CBOs in the village.

FCP Comprehensive Internal Evaluation

A Comprehensive Evaluation study was recommended by the Gateway Consultancy group in October 2019. Gateway Consultancy was commissioned by Net4kids, Netherlands. So FCP comprehensive internal evaluation was carried out for a project period of 5 years from January 2015 to December 2019. The External evaluation expert Dr.T.Thasian from Vellore was involved in the evaluation along with Dr.A.Britto Selvaraj, Ms.R.Palaniammal, and Mr.Joesph Alexander Louis from SSH. In depth evaluation was carried out by using quantitative and qualitative evaluation tools. The evaluation brought out valuable findings and brought out various recommendations under the following five programme components.



- Health & Wellness
- Education & Literacy
- Economics & Livelihood
- Psycho social support
- Social inclusion and Networking.

The major findings and recommendation as cited in page number 48 to 54, is very valuable for long term strategic perspective planning. The evaluation report contains 138 pages and a hard copy is available at our office for reference, if needed.

FCP ALUMNI MEET

The former beneficiary children of FCP met on 01.11.2020 at SSH training centre, Namakkal. Totally 50 former FCP children participated in the meet. Out of 50 children, 32 are studying higher education, degree and post graduate courses, one married and another one is waiting for marriage. Out of 50 children, 18 were men and the remaining 32 were women.



Values learnt due to FCP Programs

In what way you wish to support the poor children through SSH?

- Supporting poor children on their education needs.
- Organizing free medical camps.
- Facilitating free tailoring training.
- Support to higher studies for poor children.
- Supply of seeds/seedlings for tree plantation.
- Arranging free driving training.
- Supply of note books/sports materials to children.
- Sponsoring the educational tour for children.
- Financial contribution to Community education fund from their salary.
- Conducting free spoken English classes.
- Food supply to 100 persons per year.
- Help them to get admissions for higher studies.
- Sponsoring the organic farming training.

What are the strengths of FCP?

- Enabled students to score 439/500 marks in 10th standard public examination.
- Tree plantation and nature appreciation done in general.
- Supply of note books/bags/stationeries for children/ educational support.
- Supply of essential commodities to the children's families.
- Coaching/supplementary/tuition programme.

What are the limitations of FCP?

- Unable to help more than the fixed 450 children.
- Inadequate tuition centre in needy villages.
- Inadequate support for collegiate education.

What are the ways that SSH can help for higher education?

SSH can plan programmes for the higher education students on the following aspects;

- Provide Education support for higher education / college studies.
- Supply of books / notebooks to higher education students.
- Life skill training.
- Handicrafts training.
- Supply of healthy food.
- Financial support for college fees.
- Driving training.
- Career guidance training at the senior level.
- Coaching for govt competitive examination.

Final feedbacks;

12 participants indicated that this kind of meet should be conducted on half yearly basis, 6 were in favor of yearly meeting. They showed interest to develop this alumni association in enrolling more former children of FCP, now in different places. During the current National level lockdown, around 70% of the invited students from Namakkal district have attended this meet.

Developing my inward and outward personality...

I am Hema, aged 15, studying in 10th standard at govt higher secondary school, Pudhupatty. My father Mr.Raj, aged 40 was sick, bedridden and unable to work for salary of our family expenses. Soon after, my mother goes for agriculture coolie for the wage of Rs.150/- per day. I got enrolled into FCP programme 3 years before. Since my joining, I used to get nutrimix, protein rich nuts, dates, soya beans, bathing soap, washing soap, tooth paste, hair shampoo, hair oil, uniforms, notebooks, school bags etc. My school fee was also paid by SSH. I attended different trainings like life skill, kitchen garden, computer literacy, goal setting, yoga, female children's protection, counseling etc. They had taken me to educational tour and visited Palakad, Malapura dam (Kerala staff) and Coimbatore marutha malai. I also developed the habit of small saving. At the school level, I participated in many competitions and received prizes. Now, I am eating good food at home and studying well. I am ever grateful to SSH and Net4kids for their valuable support. My inward and outward personality is developed through their support.



Both husband and wife are HIV infected - Husband died, what happened to the widow?

I am Mrs.S.Parvathi, 38 years old, living at Siluvampatty, Namakkal district. As HIV infected I am taking ART tablets for the last 8 years. With my single earning I found really hard to educate my daughter till her higher secondary schooling and she was about to be dropped from the school. After joining FCP programme 5 years before my family has been getting remarkable support both in terms of kind and counseling services. Consistent efforts from SSH staff made we join the local Ishwaryam Women Group (IWG) which supported me with Rs.10,000/- to peruse my daughter's college education. Ms.Durga Devi is studying B.Com first year in a renowned college in Namakkal. But for SSH and the local women group my girl child would not have completed her higher secondary schooling and continuing college education. I am thankful to SSH and Net4kids for the permanent impact that is making on the lives of underprivileged families and children like us.



Community Based Organizations (CBOs)

Together, we overcome Covid-19 situation

Together, we strive towards a Corona free environment with the support of its community based organizations. SSH encourages children to continue their studies in spite of a long lockdown of schools through evening schools, online classes, alternative learning centres etc as well as making them responsible for continuum education, improved health & hygiene, environmental sanitation, energized leadership both in schools and communities etc and empowers the women to become entrepreneurs and village level potential leaders in the community.

1. Achievements / outcomes of CC

- Around 80% of the CC children are taking Kabasura herbal drinks as per the direction of government regularly to prevent Corona virus.
- Some children's club even supplied the Kabasura drinks to their community members in association with SHG members.
- Around 50% of the CC children were involving in part time works like small animal rearing, flower picking, egg collection etc just to tide over the family economic burden during the lockdown period.
- Around 80% of our target children are continuously wearing the mask whenever they are going outside along with other government standard operating procedures like washing the hands frequently, sanitizer and maintaining social distance.
- Almost 60% of the target children are regular to their evening tuition centres in local villages.
- Around 650 tree saplings planted through Ccs.
- Almost 50% of the community children are attending online classes regularly.
- Gender discrimination is diminishing in general among CBOs.

- 7 Child marriages prevented just on time.
- Each CBO member is fully aware of COVID-19 and its implications on personal health, family economic, devoid of education, social exclusion etc.
- Almost 115 young children are polio vaccinated.
- Around 654 Kitchen Gardens are formed with a minimum of six different vegetable plants.
- Though regular savings could not be maintained during this lockdown period, all CCs were able to sustain their already saved amounts in banks or post office.
- Started working on chlorination of water tanks, environmental sanitation etc in view of keeping the Dengue away.



2. Achievement of CSGs

- All 34 CSG members are continuing their studies.
- 10 CHLAs are taking ART regularly and maintained their CD4 count.
- Mutual sharing through cell phone with regard to health care information especially Corona Virus and preventive measures was done.
- Conducted regular monthly meeting in spite of less transport facility.
- Peer counseling was very much effective in monitoring ART adherence among CLHAs.
- They were also able to sustain their linkage with other NGOs & Govt departments.



3. Achievements of ALC

- Children practicing yoga and simple exercise at home regularly.
- 55 tree saplings planted in common places.
- 20 children improved their handwriting by practicing cursive writing.
- 60% of children attending online classes regularly.
- All the children are practicing corona preventive measures like wearing mask, washing hand with sanitizer, maintaining social distance, taking Gabasura drinks etc.
- 20 individual toilets constructed.
- 45 children formed kitchen garden with 5 varieties of vegetables.



4. Achievements of LFCN

- 49 children newly joined LFCN.
- Desilting the ponds and removing the Karuvelam trees in 4 villages along with SHG and youth groups namely Kokkupatti, Kongarkulam, Alayampatti, Boothipuram.
- 5 Child marriages were stopped in Alagampatti, Kongarkulam, Kosavampatti, Ottupatti.
- Corona virus awareness given to almost 20 villages.
- Involved in pulse polio camps in 5 villages and assisting the medical team to bring 244 children for vaccination.
- In 10 villages the children prepared seed balls and disseminated the seeds along roadside and public lands.



- Availed civic amenities like road facility, drinking water, street light and drainage in 5 villages through Panchayat raj administration.
- More importance given to indigenous sports and games.

5. Achievements of PSG

- PSG members continued to share their problems and get guidance through phone.
- 22 members were linked to other NGOs for Corona relief support.
- No lacuna found in ART adherences.
- 80% of them are willing to send their children for higher education when the colleges are opened.
- Government Health care services increased for symptomatic Corona patients.
- 7 PSG members are active as Peer educators.



6. Achievements of BWF

- 5 women availed free house patta from government revenue department.
- Corona awareness camps were conducted and distributed Kabasura drinks, and masks.
- Availed 25 free tailoring machines from govt.
- 75 women members got job opportunity from private institutions.
- Installation of 5 new pipes for safe drinking water, 10 street lights and cement road for 3 villages availed through Panchayat raj administration.
- Around 70% of the BWF members have their own small kitchen gardens at home.
- 840 members are already vaccinated against corona.
- 245 new members joined BWF.
- BWF members allowed 32 children for using their android mobile phones for their online/digital education.
- 45 members were newly admitted to MGNREGA scheme.
- Distributed around 800 Kg of rice to the most deserving 80 Corona affected families.

7. Achievements of SHGs/IWGs

- 60 women newly joined 100 days of employment scheme.
- Around 85% of women are using toilets due to health education.
- Women members are interested in taking self and family insurance.
- 8 villages availed basic facilities like proper drainage system, street light, drinking water, road facility etc through local government.
- 70% of them are taking cereals and millets in their diet.
- Herbal and Siddha treatment for minor illness like cold, cough, fever, body pain, head ache etc got momentum.
- 30 women started self trades like petty shop, tailoring, selling idly flour, goat rearing, Masala powder selling etc.
- All SHG members are taking precautions against corona virus through wearing mask, avoiding social gathering, washing hands, keeping social distance etc.
- Nearly Rs.32000 collected through LRM and distributed the vegetable & grocery items to 80 families.
- 12 groups got the subsidy loan to the tune of 46 lakh from nationalized banks.



8. Achievements through LRM

Prime support groups involved in this task are Koolaiyapillai pathirakadai, Nijam store, Jeyam tex, Hotel Nala, Vijayan traders, SHGs, harani hardwares, Ponmani Pathirakadai, Harish textile, Jewelry shop, textile shop trades, grocery shop, philanthropist, IT employees, PRIs and medical shop etc.

- Supports distributed to 150 families and 12 children received regular support from 6 donors for school fees, nutrition food, and travel support for ART treatment.
- From 65 Donors and distributed things to 250 families like Rice, dhal, pulses like green peas, cow pea, bengal gram, dates, biscuits, mat, dress materials, health care items (washing soap, bathing soap, paste), tiffin box, stationeries etc.



9. Achievement of Sport Day

- 10 children won prizes for district level Kabbadi competition.
- Many FCP supported children participated in different competitions.
- Inter school athletic tournament was conducted by Salem Sahodaya; one of our students was placed first in high jump.
- Namakkal district sports authority conducted athlete monthly meet in which one of our students won third place in high jump, third place in javelin throw, third place in long jump and third place in 300 meters dash.
- In district level Chess tournament one of our students came out with first prize.
- District level Rope Skipping competition was held at Gandhi Stadium, Salem. 15 students from our school participated and many of them came out with first, second & third prizes. One among them was selected for National level, which in turn was held at Madhya Pradesh.
- Annual sports day conducted between CBOs at 28 villages and prizes to a worth of Rs. 15,000 distributed.
- Children showed interest to learn about traditional games.
- Social inclusion increased as more number of students coming forward to participate in sports and games.



Future Doctor, new in 7th std with HIV/AIDS...

P. Rajeev, 12 years old studying in 7th std in Govt high school at Kathapally. He lost his father due to HIV/AIDS and living with his mother along with 2 sisters. As infected he and his mother are taking ART medicines. As his living area was a malaria prone area he uses to get malaria fever through mosquito bites. This situation made him absent to school frequently and was getting a 'D' grade. Luckily he got the support for opportunistic infection from SSH along with other regular supports which enabled him to get treatment for TB also at a regular interval and protein rich food. As a result his CD4 level was increased from 800 to 900 and HB level was increased from 8 to 10 gms. Now, he is regular to his school education and he could also upgrade his educational standard from D grade to B grade. He has number of friends in school which in a way motivated him to participate in any training programmes organized by SSH. He wants to become a medical doctor and provide treatment for HIV/AIDS victims. I am confident to moving towards my desired dream.



My new avathar ...

My name is V.Akilandeswari 42 years old living at Jangalapuram, Namakkal. My husband Sundaram 45 years old, he met an accident breaking his leg and done surgery. He is not able to do any work, simply stays at home. I have 3 children two male and one female studying at Govt high school Jangalapuram. As a heart patient I am unable to go for any regular work but I go for occasional works. This meager amount is not sufficient to meet out the expenses on food, education, and treatment etc. With the support of SSH staff I got an entry into local SHG and became a member of Bharathi Women Federation (BWF). I was lucky enough to have attended different trainings like digital literacy, cyber crime and micro credit etc. Our women group was kind enough to provide an IGP support of Rs.10,000/- to which with my little contribution I started my own a toy business one year before. I am getting a profit of Rs.200/- per day. Through the guidance of BWF and the child help line I was able to stop two child marriages. I am happy to claim myself as a child rights activist creating a better platform for child development in my region. Thanks to SSH for making me a social change agent.



Corona Relief Support

Ever since the Corona lockdown started from March 2020, the children were feeling stress, anxiety, grief, and worry. Fear and anxiety about their own health and the health of loved ones caused strong emotions. It was enhanced when children were not able to go out, play, attend school or interact freely. Still more badly for those children and families who were subjected to quarantine or isolation. Therefore, SSH concentrated on Covid-19 prevention programmes though the mobility was restricted to the field staff. But still we were able to keep in contact with the target people through health volunteers, phone, whatsapp and sometimes in person to the project area and implemented the following activities.

- A complete knowledge on COVID-19 given.
- Emotional needs of children and adolescents addressed.
- Helped children to deal with stressful and painful events.
- Unnecessary fear and rumors related to COVID-19 unfolded.
- Oriented towards possible risks of violence, abuse and exploitations at home and elsewhere.
- Provided hand sanitizer, face mask, bathing/washing soaps, detol, coconut oil, IEC materials and tooth paste etc to 605 families.
- Nutritional support including fruits & vegetables that consisted of Brinjal, tomato, potato, green chilies, ladies finger carrot, beetroot, cabbage, onion, etc was also provided to them
- Grocery kits that included rice, wheat, oil, pulses, pepper, ginger, turmeric etc were part of Covid-19 relief package.
- Nutrition awareness through promotion of Kitchen Garden, referral & linkage etc were added to enhance their food & nutritional security.



TCA

Established by Society for Serving Humanity in 2013, The ChildPlan Academy (TCA) provides quality education covering the rural children as well in Namakkal District. TCA provides education to 260 students with a capacity of 20 teaching and non-teaching staff. While underlining the importance of co-operation and mutual respect among the students and teachers, TCA continued to nurture the values of leadership, self-discipline, intellectual and emotional growth of the children whenever the teachers had a chance to interact with their counterparts.

- During the corona period, when the poor people lost their livelihood, we on behalf of the school provided them with Corona relief support materials.
- Teachers have undergone different training programmes like Revitalization of the school, Teaching strategies and methodologies, Management Improvement System etc.
